News Driving the Week

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- A new massive \$3 trillion coronavirus stimulus package includes aid for veterans who lost their health insurance, homeless veterans, native veterans and Department of Veterans Affairs employees. The nearly 2,000-page Heroes Act introduced by House Democrats Tuesday includes another \$3 trillion in funding for pandemic aid. Buried in those thousands of pages is a section dedicated to veterans and service members. Chief among the aid headed to veterans, the bill authorizes VA to provide health care for all veterans who lost their employer-sponsored health insurance because of the pandemic. Estimates for the cost of the different measures in the bill, which totals \$3 trillion and includes broad federal aid proposals, were not immediately clear. The massive funding package still faces an uphill climb in Congress before passage and must have support from the House and the Republican-controlled Senate to have a hope of passing into law.
- U.S Senators Jeanne Shaheen and Martha McSally sent a letter urging the Defense Department to expand telehealth coverage under TRICARE, the military health system's healthcare program, overseen by the Defense Health Agency. A few days later, US Senators Kelly Loeffler and Kyrsten Sinema introduced a bill aimed at expanding the ranks of care providers licensed by the Department of Veterans Affairs to use telehealth. The bill, called the VA Mission Telehealth Clarification Act, expands on the landmark VA Mission Act, signed into law in June 2018, which greatly expanded the VA's telemedicine and mHealth network by, among other things, giving VA care providers the authority to treat veterans in any location. A companion bill was filed in the House in June 2019 by US Rep. Earl "Buddy" Carter, who noted the original act allowed only doctors to deliver care.
- Tricare, the military's health insurance provider, is covering telephone appointments and has <u>eliminated copayments for telehealth services</u>. The changes will remain in effect through the national emergency, according to a new rule posted on the Federal Register by Jonathan Woodson, assistant
