House Republicans are scrambling after <u>Speaker Kevin McCarthy was ousted</u> from his position last week, the first time a Speaker has ever been removed from their office via House resolution. Experts are dubious that either of his possible replacements, House Majority Leader Steve Scalise and House Judiciary Chairman Jim Jordan, will have the votes to take his place. McCarthy has also not ruled out pursuing the position a second time. Interim Speaker Patrick McHenry says he hopes to have a new Speaker by the end of the week.

At least 11 Americans have been killed in Israel after the Gaza-based terrorist organization Hamas launched attacks over the weekend. President Biden released a statement on Monday saying it is "likely" that several missing Americans are being held hostage. Hamas is responsible for Saturday massacres that led to the deaths of over 900 Israelis. Israel has responded to the attacks, killing over 760 Palestinians.

Last week, President Biden signed a bill into law <u>extending critical VA services</u> and programs. This bipartisan effort will ensure veterans have timely access to medical disability examinations, protect student veterans from losing their earned GI Bill or other VA education benefits when educational institutions are closed, and extend emergency preparedness funding for the VA.
